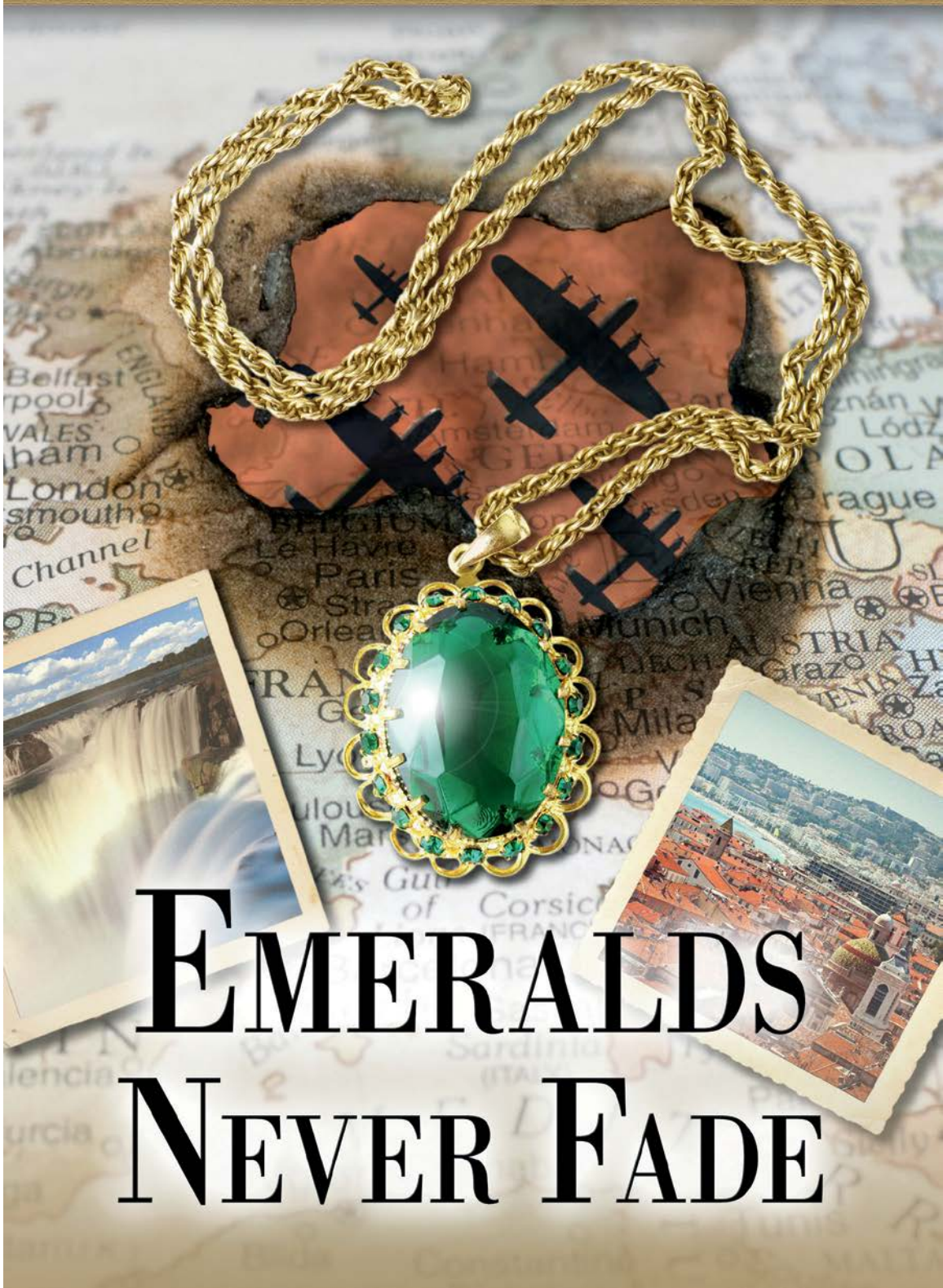

Emeralds Never Fade, a Tale of Jewish Persecution and Nazi Escape

Ridge Literary Inc. is pleased to announce the November 30, 2011 publication of *Emeralds Never Fade* by Stephen Maitland-Lewis. Spanning four decades, the novel follows the lives of two Germans—one of them Jewish.

The story begins as World War II approaches and Jewish citizens of Augsburg, Germany face growing hatred. Two boys don't care that one is a Jew, but Nazi supremacy ends their weekly piano lessons. After the war, instead of finding that his Jewish family had survived the Holocaust, Leo Bergner uncovers a conspiracy involving the Nazis, Swiss banks, and the sale of Jewish assets to finance the escape of war criminals. The other German, Bruno Franzmann, spends the war working at a concentration camp, but as the Allies advance, he risks capture and prosecution. With the help of a Catholic seminary, he escapes to South America where he hatches a plot to blackmail his fellow Nazis. For Leo and Bruno, contrasting heritage defines their separate destinies, but a lost family heirloom brings them back together, and years later, decides their fate.

Stephen Maitland-Lewis, author of *Hero on Three Continents*, drew on his Jewish background and experience as an international investment banker, combined with extensive historical research, to compose the tale of *Emeralds Never Fade*, which provides a balanced view of both Jewish and non-Jewish Germans during and after World War II. The book further speculates on conspiracies between the Nazis, Church, and Swiss banks that, while fictional, are based on actual events.

“Firstly,” Maitland-Lewis said, “I was driven to write this book as I am haunted by all that Nazi Germany represented. To quote from Sir Ian Kershaw, one of the world’s foremost experts on Hitler, ‘*The road to Auschwitz was built by hate, but paved with indifference.*’ And secondly, I am obsessed with the question of those pillars of the community who had front-row seats on the Inferno and seized upon opportunities to profit from the extermination of their Jewish neighbors and clients.”

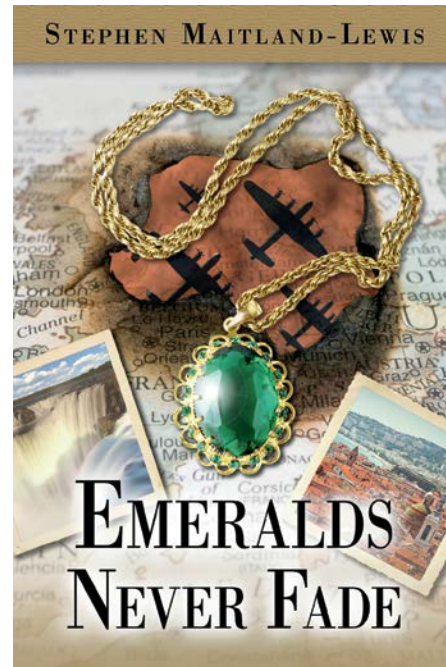

Description:

Before World War II, two German boys enjoy playing piano, and one visits twice each week to teach the other. When the Nazis seize power, the lessons must end—one of the boys is Jewish.

Leo Bergner, the Jewish pupil, escapes Germany while his piano teacher, Bruno Franzmann, is called to serve the Fatherland. His assignment to work at a concentration camp turns to peril as the war nears an end. With the Allied forces closing in, he risks capture and prosecution as a war criminal.

After the war, Leo begins a career in banking and uncovers a conspiracy of further Jewish persecution, involving the assets of concentration camp victims. His investigation into the corrupt dealings of his own bank puts him in direct opposition to his beloved Israel, while also jeopardizing his career, his marriage, and his life.

Bruno escapes to Buenos Aires and must begin anew, lost in a strange land where only his wits can save him. He hatches an unscrupulous plot to finance a multi-national corporation, and in time, his efforts require a business trip to London—his first visit to Europe since he escaped.

After forty years, a lost family heirloom will decide their fate.

Synopsis: Emeralds Never Fade

On his eighth birthday, Leo Bergner receives a wonderful gift—a piano. Better still, his father arranges for an older boy named Bruno, an accomplished pianist, to visit each week and teach Leo. Unlike Bruno, Leo is a Jew, and in the days preceding World War II, the rise of atrocities aimed at the Jewish population of Germany ends Bruno’s weekly visit to the Bergner home.

Fearing for their son’s safety, his parents send Leo to stay with cousins in France. After failed attempts to convince Leo’s stubborn father to leave Germany, at last his parents flee while they still can and join him in France, but something is wrong—his mother’s emerald pendant, passed down through generations and always around her neck, is gone. Stolen during *Kristallnacht*.

When Germany invades Poland, many fear that France is next. The Jewish community organizes an evacuation of children to Palestine for the duration of the war, and again Leo is separated from his parents. At a kibbutz in Palestine, Leo makes new friends, but restless as a teenager and determined to end Nazi oppression, he decides to join the British army.

Though not a Jew, Bruno’s life isn’t much better. Born with a clubfoot and walking with a limp, he could not join the Hitler youth. Instead he is sentenced to desk jobs, eventually as a payroll clerk at a concentration camp. When news of the Allied advance reaches the camp, Bruno makes plans to escape. But first he steals payroll records that might prove useful later. He flees across the border into Austria and meets a priest who promises safe passage over the Alps into Italy. There he hides for months in a monastery before embarking on a voyage to Argentina.

Now a British soldier, Leo reports to England where he stumbles upon a synagogue service and meets a kind and sympathetic man. Invited for dinner, Leo is the guest of a distinguished Jewish family, and he is taken by the youngest daughter. Romance blossoms but Leo is called for duty in Cairo, then Italy and eventually Holland, from where his unit penetrates German lines and liberates a concentration camp. As the war winds down, Leo returns to London hoping to resume his romance, and she accepts his proposal. Leo and his new wife travel to France in search of his family, and finding no trace of them, he can only assume they perished in the Holocaust.

Settled in Buenos Aires and thirsting to advance, Bruno hatches a plot to blackmail his fellow Nazis—using the payroll records from the camp. His bank account swells, and mingling with prominent Argentine political figures elevates him to a position of power that fuels a string of business acquisitions. He is introduced to the beautiful daughter of an important general, and in time she becomes his wife. For her birthday, from the cache of stolen valuables he had smuggled out of Germany, he selects the best—a stunning emerald pendant.

In Geneva, Leo begins a career in banking and his duties include weekly trips to Rome, acting as a courier of gold and precious artwork delivered to a Catholic seminary. Years later, Leo uncovers questionable accounts linked to his assignments as a courier, and he determines the deliveries were the assets of concentration camp victims. His tenacity to expose the truth risks his marriage, his career, and even his life, as hired thugs beat him within an inch of it.

After recovering from his injuries, Leo relocates to London, and his childhood friend from Israel is in town for a conference. He convinces Leo to attend the crowded event, where Leo recognizes a man with a limp. And his wife—wearing his mother’s emerald pendant. Bruno flees the scene as Leo’s frenzy ends in his collapse.

Determined to track down the emerald, Leo obtains a dossier on Bruno and books a flight to Argentina. From his hotel in Buenos Aires, he telephones Bruno to arrange a meeting they will both regret.

World War II is looming, but two German boys only know their shared love of playing the piano. Soon, forces beyond their control or understanding, separate them as Germany becomes an unsafe place for Jews. Leo Bergner's parents see themselves as German, not just Jews, and refuse to believe Hitler will go as far as the rumor mill suggests. After family begs them to see the writing on the wall, Leo's parents ultimately send him to safety in Palestine.

Bruno's parents force him to quit teaching the Jewish pupil, and he ends up joining Hitler's troops. Thanks to a bum foot, he is spared getting his hands too dirty in the war, but he gains valuable knowledge while working in an administrative capacity at a concentration camp. Knowledge he later uses to his advantage.

The story continues to unfold. Leo ends up fighting the Germans in the British army while Bruno escapes to Argentina just before the Allied Forces close in. Leo feels the burden of his past, of his lost loved ones, even when he marries and moves into a career in banking. Bruno uses information gathered during the war to survive.

Leo ultimately uncovers a bank conspiracy involving stolen Jewish possessions. His family's lost emerald heirloom, stolen during the war, brings the two men back together in an explosion of emotions and fate.

The author intricately weaves together the stories of Leo and Bruno throughout the novel. Each man is affected by the war, but uses different means to cope and move on. From the moment Bruno steals the emerald, we know their fates are intertwined. With each page turn, we eagerly anticipate how the two stories will collide. The author leaves us guessing until the very end.

Although the novel is a thrilling page-turner, it is still steeped in emotion. Both men are victims of circumstance. I found Leo's letters from his mom particularly touching, and Bruno grew up under the thumb of selfishness and judgment. Neither man's character is clear cut, both are just men held strongly in the often cruel hands of fate. You will enjoy this rich story, and its well-crafted characters, from beginning to end. An amazing cover seals the deal.

In this gripping novel of historical fiction, the author explores an infrequently examined aspect of the Holocaust: what happened to the money, jewelry, and other assets stolen from the Jews by the Nazis? How complicit were the banks of Switzerland? And what role did the church have in the theft?

The setting is World War II. Two boys, Bruno and Leo, both German and the latter Jewish, have a brief acquaintance as the former instructs the latter in piano. To keep him safe from the increasing restrictions against the Jews, Leo Bergner's family sends him on a train to Nice, France, where he is to stay with his aunt and uncle; his mother and father temporarily stay behind. After that, Leo and Bruno Franzmann, the German piano teacher, have no contact for decades.

Leo's mother Ulrike owns a precious and unique emerald, one that was handed down from her great-grandmother. One day, Ulrike comes home without her emerald; though she refuses to say what happened to it, she is devastated by its absence, and Leo is devastated on her behalf.

A series of events lands Leo on a kibbutz in Palestine. Leo's military career begins here and eventually takes him all over Europe. He marries but is unlucky in love. Through his father-in-law, however, he does enter a second career as a banker. All the while, Leo is never certain as to what happened to his family; he lost touch with them soon after arriving in the Middle East.

A concurrent story is being told about Bruno. While Bruno spent the war years as a file clerk at a concentration camp, he knows he will be prosecuted after the war. Bruno steals some files and with the help of a monastery, he ends up in Argentina, where he reinvents himself as Bruno Fernandez. Using underhanded methods, Bruno becomes a wealthy businessman. Fast-forward four decades. Now the setting is a conference room in London. Leo catches a glimpse of his former piano teacher and his wife...and of a long-lost family heirloom.

The story is well-constructed as the viewpoints shift between Leo and Bruno over forty years. Maitland-Lewis has created authentic characters that simultaneously evoke sympathy and provoke outrage. Particularly compelling storylines are Leo's frantic search for his family and his feelings about his crumbling marriage. Part expose, part love story, part homage to family, the author deftly takes the reader through a shameful time in history as he laments what was lost. He indicts "bystanders" who profited from the atrocities of Jewish extermination, including not only the Nazis but some of the German people, the church, and Swiss banks. This is a real page-turner that will not only entertain but will also shed light on a little-known aspect of the consequences of World War II.

Stephen Maitland-Lewis, whose occupations have included attorney, banker, and luxury hotel owner, is also the author of the novel *Hero on Three Continents*.

In January of 2016, Maitland-Lewis was sworn in as a Freeman of the City of London and admitted as a Liveryman of the Worshipful Company of City Solicitors. In April of 2016, he became a Fellow of The Royal Geographical Society (FRGS). Maitland-Lewis and his wife, Joni Berry, divide their time between their homes in Beverly Hills and New Orleans.
